The journey from housing to home

Housing is a term that has different meanings, depending on who is using the term and in what context. Webster's Dictionary defines housing as shelter, as lodging and as a habitable dwelling. When we hear the word home it brings to mind a safe place for our families.

Massachusetts is experiencing a housing crisis, with a lack of housing across the board for market rate and affordable units, rental and homeownership, with skyrocketing costs that are impacting all of us. The number of unhoused residents is over 15,000. Adult children are living with parents for longer periods. Young professionals are unable to purchase homes and shelters are filled to capacity. There is no one easy solution and no single answer to the complex problems that have been festering for years and recently made more precarious by the pandemic. Fortunately, there are solutions to increase housing stock and start to create housing where people can build a home.

This article is the second in a series of article about housing written by members of the newly formed Greater Newburyport Housing Choice Coalition: a group of people and organizations that will be advocating for more safe, accessible and affordable housing choices in the communities of Amesbury, Newbury, West Newbury, Salisbury and Newburyport. The coalition is a partnership between the YWCA Greater Newburyport and CHAPA (Citizens Housing and Planning Association)

This article highlights a program called RAFT (Rental Assistance for Families in Transition) and it is specific to Massachusetts residents. The mass.gov website states: "RAFT provides up to \$7,000 per 12-month period so your family can stay in your current home or move to a new one. You may use the money for rent, utilities, moving costs, and mortgage payments. You can learn more about RAFT and other housing resources by dialing 211, contacting one of the Regional Agencies that manage RAFT applications, or by contacting your local Housing Consumer Education Center (HCEC)." For the Greater Newburyport area, the local regional agency is Community Action Inc. (978-373-1971). RAFT can help with first, last and security deposits, and can also assist with mortgage payments. These applications require follow-up to ensure that the requirements are met. We encourage you to apply if you are struggling.
